

### Marshall County Republican Women



One of our ongoing Caring for America projects is contributing \$1000 to an Alabama Aviation College female student to cover testing fees. Pell grants cover tuition and books, but do not cover the fees for qualification testing, which a student must pass before getting a job in their field of study. Testing fees can run as much a \$1000, which some graduates cannot afford. This month, we will be giving another deserving student a scholarship. This will be our fifth year for this project.

Tiffany presented Steve Marshall with a copy of the Library Resolution recently passed by AFRW and Geneva County Republican Women presented Steve Marshall with an appreciation plaque with a picture of Geneva's Ole Oak Tree and Scriptures.

Attorney General Steve Marshall had high praises for our President Tiffany Noel, stating "And truly if I'm looking for someone who has that compassion for where we need to be in the state, what conservatism means, Tiffany is that person".





#### **EMPOWERING 70K VOICES**


Empowering 70k Voices is the name of NFRW's 2024 membership initiative. With the goal of 70,000 members by year-end, our national federation is aiming for a 25% increase in members at all levels. To generate enthusiasm and increase participation, there will be a series of contests throughout the year.

The first contest started at NFRW's Legislative Day and is called March Madness. It is designed just like the NCAA Basketball tournament with each state in a bracket, competing against other states.

As of this writing, AFRW has advanced in the first three rounds, beating New York, South Carolina and Delaware. Teams with the highest membership percentages, not the actual number of members, advance. We currently face Connecticut with a few more weeks to go in the competition. The winning state federation will receive one paid registration for the next biennial convention to be held in Orlando in 2025 and five of the NFRW pearl and ruby 70k pins, designed specifically for the Empowering 70k project.

How does this translate to AFRW? At the end of 2023, we had 1718 members. Our goal for 2024 is 2148 members and currently we are at 62% of that goal with 1332 paid members as of April 4. We have set a prize--actually two of them--for our clubs this year. The club with the highest percentage increase AND the club with most new members will each receive one paid registration for the 2025 AFRW biennial convention.



#### Diane Caldwell, 2nd VP.

Diane Caldwell serves as Second Vice President of AFRW. She is also the current club president of Republican Women of North Shelby County, having been elected in 2022. From 2021-2022 she served as club secretary. A lifelong conservative, she has worked to elect Republicans in Alabama, Illinois, Pennsylvania and Georgia and has knocked on doors with the Mighty Alabama Strike Force. Britney received her B.A. in Public Relations and Political Science from the University of Alabama in 2008 and her M.P.A. from Auburn University at Montgomery in 2011. After graduation, she became a State Monitor for the Alabama Department of Economic and Community Affairs.

In 2009, Britney was the Grassroots Coordinator for the Tim James for Governor campaign. Following the 2010 primary, Britney became a State Field Coordinator for Dr. Robert Bentley for Governor. Britney served as a surrogate and was the point person for Dr. Bentley's Montgomery grassroots fundraiser, which raised over \$125,000.

Following Dr. Bentley's successful election, Britney served first as Finance Director (in 2011) and then as Political Director (2013) for the Alabama Republican Party. Her success at ALGOP made her well-known across the State as "someone to watch," culminating in the historic Republican victories in 2014. As Political Director, Britney organized all aspects of the 2014 ALGOP campaign, which swept all statewide offices, expanded majorities in both chambers giving Republicans a supermajority in the Legislature, and numerous victories in local races.

From 2014 to 2018, Britney served as Government Relations Director for the American Heart Association, Alabama Chapter where she was AHA's primary lobbyist. Securing over \$500,000 through three six-figure grants in funding for her advocacy campaigns, she received national attention by winning the AHA Greater Southeast Affiliate "Grassroots Advocacy Award."

Britney founded Garner Consulting Services, LLC in 2014, providing comprehensive political campaign consulting services at all levels of government. Garner Consulting Services has directed successful campaigns for Alabama Supreme Court Justice and Chief Justice, Court of Civil Appeals, State Treasurer, State Commissioner of Agriculture and Industry, State School Board, and several Alabama Legislature races.

During the 2018 election cycle, Britney secured almost \$3 million in support for her clients.

Britney served two terms as the President of the Alabama Federation of Republican Women and is currently Member at Large for the National Federation of Republican Women.

Britney is married to Timothy Garner. The couple have a daughter, Mae, aged 6 and live in Birmingham.
